# Message from the Board Chair

I also extend my thanks to the Centre staff for their entrepreneurial mindset, enthusiasm and dedication to helping women entrepreneurs throughout Manitoba.



How would the Business Advisors define success for this year? Colleen has spearheaded our industry-specific business training at two local technical colleges. Not only has she provided in-depth training for the students who will likely be self-employed one day, she has generated income for the Centre which supports our overall program delivery. Maurice led our My Gold Mine project which successfully inspired almost two dozen entrepreneurial women to really dig into their financial information to assess their business health and make plans for growth.

Nancy and Alanna delivered the lion's share of our in-house business plan training. They would also likely define their success by the record number of business advisory sessions that took place this year. They have helped with business start-up and expansion, purchases of existing businesses, creative problem solving and strategic management.

Pat, our Entrepreneurship Co-ordinator, has taken on a double role this year and has successfully restored order and rationale to the Secretariat function of the Canadian Counsel of Small Business and Entrepreneurship. She's done this in addition to her duties as guide to entrepreneurial dreamers who are looking to take their first steps into the world of business.

# Success

Every year we set goals and targets, evaluate existing programs and conceptualize new initiatives. We do all of this while keeping three very important groups in mind:

Women in Manitoba who are either existing clients that we support in the growth and development of their businesses, or women who are thinking about entrepreneurship and the potential it holds for them;

Our 'moral owners', those stakeholders who are part of the entrepreneurial, societal, regulatory, economic, demographic, or technological environment who understand, support, and are resources for our organization. Their experiences, knowledge and perspectives help our Board to maintain currency in the development and honing of our Strategic Outcomes.

The interests of three groups always factor into the programs we develop and the services we deliver. They are like the North Star, guiding our planning and influencing our work. With that in mind, it is always an interesting exercise to look back on what we aspired to do at the start of the year, what we were striving to achieve, and the successes we saw along the way. It was another busy and rewarding year during which we continued our quest to be an Entrepreneurial Centre of Excellence.

## Advising and Supporting Women Entrepreneurs

 Each member of the Centre's highly skilled business advising team draws on their knowledge, education and entrepreneurial experience to assist clients at every stage of business development. Collectively, they have expertise in marketing, operations, strategic planning, human resources, finance, and inventory management. Two of the advisors are fluently bi-lingual (English and French). This fiscal year, our business advisors provided 1875 advisory services to our clients.

- To ensure that our clients receive the relevant, timely and accurate information, it is important for our staff to connect with industry experts and proactively develop their skills. This year, staff participated in the Canadian Council for Small Business and Entrepreneurship Conference in Halifax, the WEConnect Conference in Toronto, and the WEBENC event in Florida as well as a myriad of professional development courses, conferences, webinars and discussions.
- 114 business plans were received and reviewed this year, many of which formed the basis for advisory sessions and resulted in loans.

- In support of women entrepreneurs around Manitoba, we travelled to a variety of locations within the province. We combined a presentation at the Manitoba Chambers of Commerce AGM in Morden and Winkler with an opportunity to visit women-owned businesses in the area. We took part in Take the Leap IV, the rural entrepreneurship conference that is held regularly in Dauphin. We also travelled to Brandon for regular client meetings and took part in the International Women's Day celebrations hosted by Community Futures Whitehorse Plains in Portage la Prairie.
- WEConnect Certification assists businesses that are 51% or more women-owned and controlled to connect with corporations and government agencies that are increasingly seeking to diversify their supply chains. Two WECM staff members are the program certification assessors in Manitoba and have helped to certify seven Women Business Enterprises since the program began in 2010.


#### Training for Women Entrepreneurs

- This year we exceeded our targets for both the number of participants and the number of sessions delivered. In total, 1671 clients took part in 131 training sessions, significantly exceeding our targets. Updates and adjustments are made regularly. Feedback from participants assures us that our offerings are meeting their needs. To ensure our clients remain engaged with the Centre, we regularly add new topics and facilitators. Among this year's new sessions were 'Let's Talk Mobile Media' and 'Using Online Content, Conversation and Persuasion to Build Your Business'.
- In September 2012, we introduced a revised delivery model of the Business Plan Workshop Series. Rather than offering the sessions on three consecutive days over two weeks, we began offering the classes on Tuesday evenings from 5:30 to 8:30 over six weeks. This revision proved very successful. Participants have time to work on their plans between classes. Now most participants sign up for and complete the entire series rather than signing up for a few classes at a time.

- We introduced '10 Tips for Starting a Home-Based Business' at the 2012 Farm Women's Conference that took place in Winnipeg.
- We continue to use technology to reach entrepreneurs who may not be able to visit the Centre because of location or other constraints.
   The four-part online business plan development series continues to be a valuable tool for entrepreneurs in rural Manitoba. It also draws registrations from across Canada and around the world. We enhanced our online offerings this year with the addition of 'Assess Your Business Startability'; 'Introduction to Business Technology'; and 'Living in the Cloud'.
- We were very pleased to continue delivering in-depth business training at Wellington College and MC College, two Winnipeg technical colleges where many of the graduates will become self-employed at some point in their careers.

#### Loans for Women Entrepreneurs

- It was a very busy year for the loans department.
   We approved 17 start-up and expansion loans and disbursed \$1,273,592 to clients around the province.
- An additional \$1,392,095 was leveraged in partnership with other financial institutions and private equity sources.
- 63.5 full-time job equivalent jobs were created or maintained as a result of financing provided by the Centre.
- In order to generate referrals, leverage funds and discuss best practices, it is necessary to maintain regular contact with the business community.
   In addition to presentations to financial institutions and attendance at monthly Risk Management Association meetings, our staff regularly took part in networking opportunities to build awareness about the loan program.



#### **Connecting with Women Entrepreneurs**

- Technology has been a great way to connect with existing and potential women entrepreneurs in Manitoba. Weekly blogs, daily Facebook posts, website updates and our twice-monthly electronic newsletter are supported by participation in trade shows, presentations to various groups, and strategic advertising. In total, 367 marketing activities were carried out during the year.
- The Centre signed on as an affiliate partner of Centrallia, the wildly successful global business to business forum held for the second time in Winnipeg in October 2012.
- The Centre sponsored the 2012 Venture Challenge Awards Luncheon that recognized the top three presentations made by six ventures to a panel of experts. The top six finalists included two WECM clients.
- For the fourth year we worked with the Women Lawyers' Forum of the Manitoba Bar Association to host a networking event. Boost Your Social Intelligence: Professional Development Networking Event took place at the Plug In Gallery on April 19. Lew Bayer of Civility Experts was the keynote speaker. The evening provided the opportunity for women lawyers, entrepreneurs, accountants and bankers to connect, build their networks and enhance their knowledge. This year, we sold 81 tickets and generated \$2750 in sponsorship support.
- For the 10th consecutive year, the Centre sponsored and presented the Building Business Award at the Women Business Owners of Manitoba's Women Entrepreneur of the Year Awards in May.
- In November, we co-hosted the fourth Aboriginal Business Forum in Flin Flon and The Pas with our partners at Entrepreneurship, Training and Trade and the Louis Riel Capital Corporation. It featured a day of workshops and networking opportunities.
- Information about the Centre's programs and services was added to the Province of Manitoba's Business Gateway, an online resource portal designed to assist entrepreneurs throughout the province.

In March, Daphne Meredith, the new Assistant
Deputy Minister for Western Economic Diversification
Canada made her first visit to the Women's
Enterprise Centre of Manitoba. This provided us with
an opportunity to share our experiences and learn
first-hand about WD's priorities.

## Innovative Programs for Women Entrepreneurs

- We launched Power Hour in June. This luncheon series was designed to provide insight into what 'powers' Canada's most successful entrepreneurs.
   We were able to take advantage of John Stanton's pre-Manitoba Marathon visit to Winnipeg and invited him to deliver the first keynote presentation.
   As founder of the Running Room, his range of experience was relevant for entrepreneurs at all stages of their business development.
- The official launch of the training portion of My Gold Mine took place on October 2. With funding from Status of Women Canada, the program was designed to help women better use their financial information to make strategic business decisions. The initiative includes two seminars ('The Language of Financials' and 'Financial Toolkit for Business Growth') which are followed by one-on-one advising appointments focussing on the custom-designed software that will help clients use existing financial information to make growth decisions. The project pilot and a subsequent delivery that was supported by funding from NRC-IRAP resulted in 24 women acquiring a deeper understanding of their financial information. A promotional video that included interviews with participants and an explanation on the program is featured on the WECM website. An external evaluation of the program stated: "The MGM Project has helped women business owners increase their financial knowledge and analysis skills. positioning them to take greater control over their business and providing them with a foundation on which to make informed business decisions going forward. These women entrepreneurs feel they now have an increased knowledge and understanding of how to collect, interpret and use financial information."

- WECM co-presented MBlog 2012 with New Media Manitoba. Manitoba's first blogging conference featured a networking reception at the Free Press Café on November 23 followed by a day-long event on November 24 at Convocation Hall at the University of Winnipeg. Catherine Connors, a very successful Canadian blogger was the keynote speaker. Local bloggers and social media experts rounded out the presentations. There were 80 participants and many of them suggested that this become an annual event.
- There were three international trips this year to showcase the success of the Women's Enterprise Centre of Manitoba. At the invitation of the Federation of Canadian Municipalities we travelled to Lviv, Ukraine (October 2012) and Da Nang, Vietnam (March 2013) to speak at economic development conferences where participants are interested in the impact that women entrepreneurs have on the economy. In December, a WECM representative was invited by the Canadian Bureau of International Education which works at the regional level in Ukraine, to speak about the benefits of a women's enterprise centre from the Canadian perspective and the ongoing necessity of such a centre at a gender-equity conference. During this mission, the Deputy Governor of the Lviv Region announced that they would be forming a women's enterprise centre. Subsequently WECM provided input into the development of the roadmap for the creation of the Ukrainian centre.
- The culmination of the WEC-Tech Project took place this year. Funded by Status of Women Canada and launched in 2010, the program was designed to increase the efficiency, productivity and profitability of women-owned businesses through the adoption and use of technology. During its lifespan, 73 applications were submitted and 43 women progressed through some or all of the stages which included assessing their technology needs, aligning their technology plan with strategic growth objectives, integrating the new technology into their business, and receiving follow-up training and support in using their new systems to optimize results. In September, we delivered our findings from WEC-Tech at the Canadian Council of Small Business and Entrepreneurship Annual Conference

It was another busy and rewarding year during which we continued our quest to be an Entrepreneurial Centre of Excellence.
